

1. How does a film get submitted to the International Feature Film category?

The film must first be officially selected by an approved selection committee before October 1, 2025. Selection committees are pre-established committees formed by a country. Only one selection committee is allowed per country and only one film will be accepted from each country as the official selection. Filmmakers and distributors are unable to personally submit films to the Academy for consideration for the International Feature Film Award.

2. Does my country have an approved selection committee? Where can I find their information?

Official selection committees must send a list of the current committee members and updated information to the Academy by August 15, 2025, for approval before selecting a film. Selection committees are required to publish their selection process, submission information, and contact information online via a website, social media, or press announcement. 3. After my film is selected by a selection committee, is it automatically eligible for the International Feature Film category?

No. The International Feature Film administrators will review all submitted documents and determine if the selected film meets the eligibility requirements found in <u>Rule Sixteen</u>. The International Feature Film Executive Committee will then meet to resolve all questions of eligibility and rules.

4. What counts as a qualifying run? Does the film need to have the initial qualifying run in the submitting country?

The country-selected film must be first released outside the United States of America and its territories and begin a theatrical release between October 1, 2025, and September 30, 2026. It must be publicly exhibited for at least seven consecutive days in at least one commercial motion picture theater for the profit of the producer and exhibitor.

The film must be advertised and exploited during its qualifying theatrical release in a manner considered normal and customary to theatrical feature distribution practices. For additional information regarding a qualifying theatrical release, please check the eligibility rules <u>HERE</u>.

5. If my film is a co-production with multiple countries and a film team of crew members from different nationalities, which country would I submit it to?

To be eligible, the film's creative control must be predominantly in the hands of citizens, residents or individuals with refugee or asylum status in that country. The submitting country must provide a detailed breakdown showing the nationalities, residences or refugee/asylum status of the key filmmakers, as well as the countries where the production companies are based.

This information must demonstrate that the majority of key filmmakers and production companies are from, or have refugee or asylum status in, the submitting country. All questions of eligibility and rules will be reviewed and decided by the International Feature Film Executive Committee.

6. If my animated film or documentary is selected for the International Feature Film category, is it automatically entered in the Animated Feature Film category or Documentary Feature category?

No. Animated Feature Film and Documentary Feature Film are separate specialty categories with their own submission forms. The forms must be completed on the submissions site for consideration.

7. Do I need to submit both closed captions and subtitles?

Yes. The English closed captions and English subtitles must be uploaded in two separate files. They are REQUIRED for the submission. Please see the <u>technical specification page</u> for more information.

8. Do I need to provide a DCP?

For the initial entry, International Feature Films are not required to provide a DCP. If the film is shortlisted, an unencrypted DCP will be required. Encrypted DCPs will not be accepted.

9. If my film were to win in the International Feature Film category, who would receive an Oscar statuette?

The Academy statuette (Oscar) will be awarded to the film and accepted by the director on behalf of the film's creative talents. However, the country is credited as the nominee and winner. The director's name will be listed on the statuette plaque after the country and film title. One loan of a replica Oscar can be requested for display purposes only by the production company listed on the official submission form.
